





 were attacking the Bible




"Fundamentalist" Defined (July 1920)


- Many Christians believe that evolution has never been adequately demonstrated
- They see it as unsupported speculation, on a collision course with the facts
- In their view, evolution is an example of "science falsely so-called" (1 Timothy 6:20)



- Many Christians see

- In their view, teaching evolution in public schools is a violation of the Constitutional mandate for religious neutrality on the part of our government





- The confrontational attitude of Bryan and others in the 1920s is readily seen today in Ken Ham and his creationist ministry, Answers in Genesis
- However, unlike Bryan, Ham rejects not only evolution, but also the great age of the earth—which did not bother Bryan or other fundamentalists of his day


- As with the 1920s, culture wars are still a large part of this

 - —Psalm 11:3






- The Bible is the ONLY truly reliable source of knowledge about the origin of the earth and the universe


Whitcomb & Morris, The Genesis Flood (1961)

 science are fully accepted





- They co-existed with us until some point after the Flood





- The Bible tells us that the earth is "young" (not more than about 10,000 years old), and that all major kinds of living things were created separately, in six 24-hour days, not long ago
- Mainstream science puts the ages of the earth & the universe as:
- Earth = 4.54 BY
- Universe = 13.798 BY





- Creationists believe that the big bang is a false theory that contradicts the Bible
- "When first proposed, [the big bang] was an attempt to explain how the universe could have been created without God. Really, it is an alternative to the Bible; so it makes no sense to try to 'add' it to the Bible."

- When speaking about such views, they often use the words "compromise" or "accommodation" as pejorative terms

- The Flood was responsible for producing many fossils, during human history
- This view is called "flood geology," and it utterly contradicts natural history since the early 19th century



Scofield Reference Bible (new & improved edition, 1945; first published in 1909)

- From the mid-nineteenth century through the midtwentieth century (roughly **1860 to 1960**), most conservative Protestant writers in the USA held to either the day-age or gap theory of Genesis
- That is, they accepted the validity of an "old" earth and universe
- This is reflected, e.g., in the Scofield Reference Bible (1909), which was very widely used by conservative **Protestants**

¹ Elohim (sometimes Elor Elah), English form "God," the first of the three primary names of Deity, is a uni-plural noun formed from El = strength, or the strong one, and Alah, to swear, to bind oneself by an oath, so implying faithfulness. This uni-plurality implied in the name is directly asserted in Gen. 1. 26 (plurality), 27 (unity); see also Gen. 3. 22. Thus the Trinity is latent in Elohim. As meaning primarily the Strong One it is fitly used in the first chapter of Genesis. Used in the O. T. about 2500 times. See also Gen. 2. 4, note; 2. 7; 14. 18, note; 15. 2, note; 17. 1, note; 21. 33, note; 1 Sam. 1. 3, note.

² But three creative acts of God are recorded in this chapter: (1) the heavens and the earth, v. 1; (2) animal life, v. 21; and (3) human life, vs. 26, 27. The first creative act refers to the dateless past, and gives scope for all the geologic ages.

The "light" of course came from the sun, but the vapour diffused the light. Later the sun appeared in an unclouded sky.

 William Bell Riley (1861-1947), founding president of the World Christian **Fundamentals** Association, could not identify a single "intelligent fundamentalist who claims that the earth was made six thousand years ago; and the Bible never taught any such thing."





- During this period, belief in a young earth & flood geology was prominent only among fringe groups such as the Seventh-day Adventists, who followed the creationist views of prophetess Ellen G. White (1827-1915)
- (Dr. Benjamin Carson is probably the most wellknown Adventist today)

- White claimed to have experienced trance-like "visions" in which God revealed various truths to her
- In a vision about the creation week, she was "carried back to the creation and was shown that that the first week, in which God performed the work of creation in six days and rested on the seventh day, was just like every other week."


- White also taught that Noah's flood had sculpted the surface of the earth, burying the plants and animals found in the fossil record
- "Flood geology," as it was later called, became a standard part of Adventist teaching

 And, she taught that Christians should celebrate God on the Jewish Sabbath—on Saturday, not Sunday to remind us that the creation week was literal, and that God actually rested on the seventh day (Saturday)



The modern Christian world is trampling underfoot God's Ten Commandment law when they believe they can pick and choose which commandments they will keep, and which ones they don't need to keep. Isaiah 66:22-23 clearly states that the seventh-day Sabbath will be kept throughout all eternity in the New Earth, which is why there is such a concentrated effort to point out the truth of the fourth commandment in these days just before the Lord's second coming!



- Price's version of White provided the core ideas for modern creationism in the 1960s





- The Bible is NOT to be mentioned (at least for now); ditto for "God" and "theology" as far as possible
- This is a deliberate strategy, partly for constitutional reasons, to keep arguments at the level of philosophy and science


- The establishment clause in the First Amendment system lies behind this stance
- Since the 1980s, federal courts have consistently ruled that "creationism" cannot be taught in public school science classes
- Proponents of ID always want to ensure that they are not perceived as advocates of "creationism"



- the universe itself, and the objects that compose it (both living and nonliving), exhibit abundant evidence of having been "designed" by an "intelligent designer"
- They are NOT products of "blind chance"

 The biblical issues (the age of the earth, the effects of the flood, etc.) can be discussed later on, once the existence of an "intelligent designer" has been more widely accepted in the academic establishment



- ID is a "big tent", united by opposition to materialism (which is often equated with evolution or "Darwinism") and content for the time being to overlook major theological differences among adherents
- Not all ID proponents are Christians, and at least a few are not even theists







- "There is no stopping place" on this descent








- Many Christians believe

- In biblical studies, insisting on "natural" causes for all events implies that all of the miracle stories are fables













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






















- For many American Christians, the ideas of Collins,
 Polkinghorne, Russell, & Gingerich are no more acceptable than those of Dawkins
- Nevertheless, they represent a significant new feature on the historical landscape: world class scientists and theologians who accept evolution, but who also affirm the Incarnation and the bodily resurrection of Jesus
- There was no one out there like them in the 1920s


- Will voices such as these have a permanent effect on the conversation? Will their attitudes and ideas, with the passage of time, be accepted by more American Christians?
- I am an historian, not a prophet; I cannot say how this will play out
- But, not all is the same as it was in the 1920s—and that might prove to be significant in the long run







The word "creationism" was largely replaced with "intelligent design" in recent editions of the textbook Of Pandas and People following the 1987 supreme court ruling banning "creation science" teaching







- "The evidence at trial demonstrates that ID is nothing less than the progeny of creationism," Judge Jones wrote.
- As a result, "it is unconstitutional to teach ID as an alternative to evolution in a public school science classroom."



"The existence of a limit to science is made clear by its inability to answer childlike questions having to do with first and last things, questions such as, 'How did everything begin?' 'What are we all here for?" What is the point of living?' ... It is not to science, therefore, but to metaphysics, imaginative literature, or religion that we must turn for answers to questions having to do with first and last things."
